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# 2020-2021 SCHOOL REOPENING ADDENDUM

### FULL VIRTUAL PLAN: September 8 – October 5, 2020

As part of the Virtual Plan to start the school '20-'21 school year, the Middle/High School will operate on a full-day schedule Monday through Thursday. Friday will be a single-session day for students. The outline of the plan is as follows:

# > Students

- During the Virtual School Day, the remote learning schedule will be from 7:55 2:39 pm (Full Day) on Monday through Thursday.
- Friday will be a single session day for students. The schedule will be 7:55 to 12:24 pm. Students will have the opportunity to catch up on assignments, talk to a guidance counselor, or reach out to a teacher in the afternoon.
- o Google Meet is **required for each period** with a minimum face time of half the class period. All students must sign into the Google Meet within the first three minutes of class for periods 1-8. Google Meets may include, but not limited to the following purposes:
  - Introducing new skill/concept/standard
  - Small group instruction
  - Remediation
  - Enrichment
  - Ouestion and Answer
  - Discussion

#### Administrators

- o Support Teachers' instructional needs.
- Organize and plan professional learning sessions for staff
- Monitor progress of Remote Learning models and make necessary adjustments
- Communicate and provide updates to the community on remote learning

#### > Teachers

- Use Google Classroom to share learning, post activities, and assignments, collect and grade appropriate assignments (documentation of learning), and provide timely feedback to students.
- o Provide meaningful assessments and a minimum of 4 per marking period with no one assessment worth more than 15%.
- There will be no quarterlies, midterms, or finals for the 2020-2021 academic school year.
- o Minimum of five (5) graded homework and classwork assignments per marking period with a maximum of ten (10).
- Grading percentages will be 60% for assessments, 20% for classwork, and 20% for homework.
- Use Google Meet for all live instruction, small group, office hours and 1:1 meetings.
- Provide a weekly (projected) calendar of lessons, assignments, and Google Meet sessions.

- Use Google Meet, Google Hangout, and/or email to communicate with students/families about learning.
- o Use district curricula and resources to design and deliver instruction to students.
- Collaborate with colleagues to share ideas, reflect on practices, and actively support others.
- Collaborate with Child Study Team members, School Counselors and Special Education Department to meet the needs of students with IEPs.
- o Collaborate with the ESL teacher to meet the needs of ELLs.
- o Be available Friday afternoon and after-school one day a week for extra help.

### Counselors

- Use Google Meet, Google Hangout, and/or email to communicate with students/families about topics related to counseling, college/career planning, and wellness check-ins.
- Counselors will host virtual live meetings daily prioritizing the needs of students in relation to the timeframe of the school year.
- Collaborate with teachers, paraprofessional, and administrators while attending weekly meetings such as Intervention and Referral services, Child Study Team meetings, etc.
- o Communicate with students and parents regarding academic progress or concerns especially toward the conclusion of each marking period.
- o Be available on Friday afternoons for student-initiated questions or concerns.
- o Counselors will avoid, when possible, meeting with students during core academic subjects.

### > Child Study Team Members

- Use Google Meet, Google Hangout, and/or email to communicate with students/families about topics related to counseling, academics and wellness checkins.
- Case managers will host virtual IEP meetings.
- o CST will conduct evaluations as required by code.
- CST will collaborate with teachers and paraprofessionals to ensure accommodations and modifications are being implemented to the greatest extent possible.
- Collaborate with teachers, paraprofessional, and administrators while attending weekly meetings such as Intervention and Referral services.
- Be available for student-initiated questions or concerns.

### > Paraprofessionals

- Communicate with teachers, department supervisors/chairs, building principals and/or child study team case managers about student needs.
- Use Google Meet to provide online assistance to students, as appropriate.
- Support teacher planning and/or instructional needs, as coordinated by administration.
- Schedule real-time conferences with students to assess progress, and to offer assistance on work assigned by other teachers.
- Use Google Meet, Google Hangout, and/or email to communicate with teachers about student learning.
- Provide differentiation assistance to teachers, collaborating online and/or via Google Meet.

### > Parents

- Review the Guidelines for Students Participation in Live Teaching
   Sessions via Google Meets (see below), which will be communicated by the Building Principal.
- o Communicate with your child's teachers, counselors, and administrators to obtain needed assistance

### MS/HS PHASE ONE REOPENING: HYBRID A-B-C MODEL Scheduled to begin on October 5<sup>TH</sup>

Based on the Governor's recommendations for distancing, the evaluation of our building, classroom size, the number of students attending for the 20-21 school year, and the parent survey results, the High School/Middle School Administration has opted to utilize an ABC Hybrid Model for a Phase One Reopening with the least amount of people indoors for the least amount of time. **Phase 1 is scheduled to begin on Monday, October 5**<sup>th</sup>, **2020, pending BOE approval.** 

The entire school population has been divided into three groups. (Group A last names A through F / Group B last names G through N / Group C last names O through Z)

Each Group will participate in a Hybrid Schedule consisting of in person learning, Synchronous Virtual Learning, and Asynchronous Learning Activities. During Phase One the Following Schedule will be followed for **in-person learning**:

<u>Group A (Last Names A-F)</u> will physically attend school on Monday and every third Friday when Phase 1 begins.

<u>Group B (Last Names G-N)</u> will physically attend school on Tuesday and every third Friday when Phase 1 begins.

<u>Group C (Last Names O-Z)</u> will physically attend school on Thursday and every third Friday when Phase 1 begins.

<u>Fully Remote Learning Group (Last Names A-Z)</u> will follow the Hasbrouck Heights Board of Education approved 20-21 school calendar virtually. Students will participate in Wednesday virtual learning with classmates and attend office hours for additional support. All other learning will be asynchronous.

# **Explanation of Each Type of Learning Day**

#### In-Person Learning

- During in-person school days, students will move throughout the school building and attend their classes
- Students will have their temperature checked upon arrival and they will wear masks while entering the building. Students will enter the building from 7:55 am to 8:10 am.
- Students will follow their HHHS or HHMS schedule as set by the guidance counselors.
- While in school, students must wear a mask which also includes when entering and exiting the building.
- If students become ill during the day, an Isolation Room will be available for anyone who is referred by the Nurse due to symptoms or screening.

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- Just like students, staff will wear a mask throughout the entire school day.
- Time Frame for In-Person Learning- 8:10am to 12:31 pm [See HS/MS Schedule Below]

#### Virtual Instruction Wednesdays

- During the virtual day, the remote learning schedule will be from 7:55-2:39 pm (Full Day).
- Teachers will follow the 5E Model of Instruction. [See 5 E Model of Instruction Below]
- Google Meet is required for each period for attendance and educational purposes. Each Google meet will last of minimum of half the period. Students must sign into the Google Meet within the first three minutes of class for periods 1-8. Google Meets may include, but not limited to the following purposes:
  - Introducing new skill/concept/standard
  - Small group instruction
  - Remediation
  - Enrichment
  - Question and Answer
  - Discussion

### Remote Learning

On the days that students are not required to be present in school, <u>excluding</u>
 <u>Wednesdays</u>, they will be required to;

# Sign into their first period google classroom for attendance by 7:55 <u>am.</u> Then students will work on Asynchronous learning activities in each of their classes throughout the day, such as, but not limited to;

- Viewing a short video.
- Reading a passage and answering questions.
- Listening to a podcast
- · Responding to a discussion board
- Scholastic Online Magazine (Junior, Math, Science, Action)
- Go Math Online
- Edulastic (Math program that monitors student progress)
- Newsela (ELA program)
- TCI (Social Studies/Science)
- Deadlines for work completion will be stipulated by the respective teacher for that subject.

 Virtual Office Hours will be available on M/T/R/F from 1:45-2:39. Schedule as follows:

- Each office hour will begin with a mandatory Google Meet for the entire virtual learning group in order to connect with their teacher while at home. Breakout sessions may occur after the initial Google Meet.
- Virtual Office Hours are not mandatory for any students who physically attended school that day.
- All teachers of the class must be a part of the Google Meet including paraprofessionals and collaborative teachers. Breakout sessions may be facilitated by paraprofessionals, special education teachers, and regular education teachers.
- The purpose of office hours is to assist students who were remote to understand the concepts taught and to answer questions that students may have regarding assignments.
- This time may also be utilized for counseling related services, college/career planning, and wellness check-ins.
- Students who physically attended school and missed office hours should contact their teacher via email or google classroom if they have any questions or concerns.

### **Students with Specialized Programming**

#### **Individualized Education Plans**

- Students with Individualized Education Plans will have programming modifications made based on IEP mandates. To increase teacher-student engagement and support, the Middle School/High School will provide the following;
  - Students in pull-out replacement (resource/small group) classes will attend a Google Meet every day for replacement classes when they are home. The Special Education teacher will facilitate the Google Meet.
    - For example- If you are in Group A you will follow the A Day In-Person schedule. On B and C days, you will be home but expected to join the class via Google Meet during your class period.

- Students who receive in-class support (collaborative instruction), as part of their IEP, will attend a Google Meet with the Special Education Teacher for about 15 minutes of each collaborative class on the days they are home.
- Students who have paraprofessional support, as part of their IEP, will be asked to check in with their Para to complete a wellness check at a designated time during each day of remote learning.

# **English as a Second Language**

ESL Students will attend a Google Meet every day for ESL and ESL Content (Content is for HS Students ONLY) classes when they are home. The ESL teacher will facilitate a Google Meet.

For example- If you are in Group A you will follow the A Day In-Person schedule. On B and C days, you will be home but expected to join the class via Google Meets during your class period.

- The ESL teacher will provide additional ELL support for all other classes.
- The ESL teacher will be a part of ALL Google Classrooms that ESL students are enrolled in.
- The ESL teacher will collaborate with the Intervention & Referral Services (I&RS) Committee to assist with modifications and accommodations based on I&RS plans.

### **504 Plans/Intervention And Referral Services**

• Specific programming modifications will be made based on the specific needs of the students who have 504/I&RS Plans.

### **Establishing Deeper Social Connections and SEL Supports**

- All students and staff experienced some level of trauma due to the COVID-19 health crisis, prolonged quarantine, and school closure. For that reason, it is imperative that HS/MS staff and administration attend to social-emotional supports, especially through a difficult transition back to school.
- Parents and students will be offered seminars/training on health and safety protocols.

### **Middle School Counseling**

**MS Counselors** will be divided alphabetically by Grade between the two MS Counselors (Mrs. Gesell A-L and Mrs. O'Hagan M-Z). Individual meetings regarding academic advisement, social-emotional counseling, career planning, and character development will continue both in-person and throughout Asynchronous/Remote-Learning adhering to social distancing guidelines.

# GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN LIVE TEACHING SESSIONS VIA GOOGLE MEET

As part of our educational plan for Phase 1 of the 2020-2021 school year, you will be required to participate in various live *Google Meet* sessions with your teachers and classmates. This document will serve as the "ground rules" in terms of behavioral expectations and procedures while participating in **ANY** Google Meet session.

- \* Your participation in the Google Meet live sessions acknowledges that you will adhere to the guidelines listed below:
- 1) Once you enter the Google Meet (via the Google Classroom link provided by your teacher), the teacher will MUTE the entire class. This is very important so that the teacher can say hello, make sure that everyone is present, and begin explaining the lesson or activity with the entire class. You are NOT permitted to UNMUTE yourself until you follow the instructions in the next step (step # 2).
- 2) **SPEAKING/ASKING QUESTIONS-** In order to speak, ask a question, or make a comment, you can either
  - A) Raise your hand (your teacher will see you on camera- see #3)

OR

- **B)** Post a comment in the chat (which is located in the top right-hand corner of the *Google Meet* screen).
- ➤ An appropriate post in the chat would be something like, "I have a question, Mr. D'Amico." Your teacher will prompt you when to unmute yourself and speak. All comments should be directed towards the teacher. This is **VERY** important so that the teacher can instruct the class and everyone isn't talking over one another at the same time. Again, if you would like to speak, you can physically raise your hand on the screen **OR** post a comment in the class chat in the upper right-hand corner.
- ➤ You are **NOT** permitted to use your cell phone during *Google Meet* sessions. Taking pictures of the screen or recording of any kind is **NOT** permitted (see # 5).
- 3) **BEING VISIBLE-** Being visible on the *Google Meet* is up to you. If you choose to turn off your camera and simply listen, that is okay. However, you will then need to remember to utilize the chat feature in order to ask a question (wait to be prompted by the teacher to speak).

HEIGHTS: Where tradition and innovation take flight!

- > For <u>ANY</u> student who is visible on camera (which will probably be most of you), the camera <u>MUST</u> be on your face and <u>NOTHING</u> else. This way the teacher can physically see you and there is nothing to distract the other students or interrupt the activity.
- 4) **DRESS ATTIRE/LOCATION-** In order to limit distractions and interruptions, please do your absolute best to be in a safe, quiet place in your home. Also, you MUST be dressed appropriately during all *Google Meet* sessions.
- 5) **HEADPHONES-** If you have headphones available at home, please utilize them during your *Google Meet* sessions. This way there are minimal interruptions/ noise that may come from the family members within your home.
  - > If you don't have headphones, that's okay! Do NOT tell mom and dad that they need to go out and buy them.

### 6) MISBEHAVIOR/ DISRUPTIONS/ NOT FOLLOWING DIRECTIONS-

If you unmute yourself without being prompted by the teacher, put something inappropriate on-screen, or disrupt the virtual meeting in any way (cell phone being used, etc.), your teachers are able to remove you from the *Google Meet* session.

- Conduct will be handled in the same manner as in the physical school building. Disruptive or Inappropriate Behavior will be addressed according to the *Code of Conduct*.
- ➤ If you continue to exhibit inappropriate behavior, you will be removed from all live teaching components, which will ultimately affect your Class Participation grade (20%). Most importantly, you will miss out on meaningful instruction and your learning will be negatively impacted!
- > Very simply, if it's NOT okay to do in the classroom at Hasbrouck Heights Middle School, then it is NOT okay to do in a virtual classroom taught by a Hasbrouck Heights Teacher.
- ★ In order to continue our mission of providing our students with a meaningful and productive education, we expect these guidelines to be followed at ALL TIMES! Your teachers and staff members have worked extremely hard to adjust teaching and learning to fit our Hybrid/Virtual schedule for Phase 1 Reopening of school. Your job as an Aviator/ Junior Aviator is to reciprocate that HARD WORK by doing YOUR ABSOLUTE BEST to show respect and cooperation at all times.

# **ENTRY/ EXIT PLAN FOR PHASE 1 Hybrid A-B-C MODEL**

- □ **Student Entrances:** There will be 4 total entrances for STUDENTS to enter the school building during Phase 1, which is scheduled to begin on October 5<sup>th</sup>, 2020.
- > ALL Students **MUST** have their Temperature checked upon arrival.
- > Students should **NOT** be sent to school if they are exhibiting ANY of the following symptoms



# STUDENT ENTRY will be from 7:55-8:10am

(Students should NOT arrive too early as they will NOT be permitted to enter

the building until 7:55am).

- 1) HS Main Entrance (Door # 1) High School Students ONLY
- 2) Lower Parking Lot (Door # 8) -High School Students ONLY
  - 3) MS Entrance (Door # 12) Grades 6 & 7 Students ONLY
    - 4) Diagonal Path (Door # 15) Grade 8 Students ONLY



- > Cones will be set up outside of each entrance to provide social distancing for students while they await Student Entry.
- > There will be a Visitor Monitor and/ or Security Officer at each entrance facilitating the temperature screenings for Student Entry.
- ➤ Any Student with 100.0°F or higher will be denied entry into the building. A holding area will be set up at each entrance. The School Nurse will follow up with the students in each holding area to determine status.
- ➤ Once the students are approved for entry into the building, they <u>MUST</u> report **directly** to their Period 1 class.

Student Exits for Dismissal (12:31pm): Students will be dismissed from the school
building according to the location of their 8th period class. Teachers will instruct the
students of which door to use while exiting the building. Students <b>MUST</b> exit immediately
at 12:31pm.

### Academic Challenge Club- Advisor: Ms. Cassidy

The Academic Challenge club will provide middle school students the opportunity to challenge themselves academically, while showcasing their knowledge of various subject areas against other middle school students.

The MS Book Club will be open to all 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students with a passion for Reading. Students will have the opportunity to read, discuss, and share their thoughts and ideas about their independent reading in a group setting with peers.

#### Chess Club- Advisor: Mr. Binazeski

The Chess Club is designed to provide a forum for students to learn how to play the game of chess, as well as develop strategies to help them compete in tournaments against opponents in grades 6-8. Chess Club members will also be given an opportunity to compete against another local school during the school year.

### Choir Club- Advisor: Ms. Gierut

The Choir Club will be an exciting opportunity for students to showcase their talents and learn about the various components of singing in a choir. Choir students will be able to perform at our winter and spring concerts, as well as our MS/HS POPS concert throughout the year.

### **Cross Country Club- Advisor: Ms. Coffey**

The Cross-Country Club will be an athletic-based club that promotes aerobic exercise and team building. Students will have the opportunity to participate in various running activities, which will help promote aerobic and muscular endurance, as well as help students build lifelong skills related to exercise.

#### Gay-Straight Alliance Club- Advisor: Ms. Shelly

#### Golf Club- Advisor: Mr. Sicilian

Students in Grade 8 will have the opportunity to learn the basic principles of Golf; including striking, driving, and putting, as well as the rules and etiquette of Golf.

#### Junior Police- Advisor: Mr. Stillman

The Junior Police Academy takes place each summer shortly after graduation. It is a hands-on experience modeled after the real police academy and is open to all 8th grade students. This program is led by Mr. Stillman and the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department.

# Middle School Play- Advisor: Mrs. Jacobs

Membership is open to all students who share the club's goal of promoting awareness of theater and performing arts. Participation in the productions as an actor on stage is by audition only. The winter musical is for middle school students only. Drama Club is designed to develop the students' theatrical skills in theatre work. Drama provides opportunities for student actors to develop their artistic abilities and gain a working knowledge of the Theatre Arts as well as a greater appreciation for all the Arts.

# Morning Gym- Advisor: Mr. Marchese

Morning Gym is for middle school students only and will take place in the Old Gym each morning. Students may use this time to get some morning exercise with friends, while playing a variety of different team sports activities throughout the school year.

# Peer To Peer- Advisor: Mrs. Caputo

Peer to Peer is a nationally recognized club, which began in the year 2000 by the Princeton Center for Leadership training. Since its inception, the club has morphed to take on many of the challenges that both students and schools face on a daily basis. Topics covered include, but are not limited to: bullying, cyber safety, positive peer relationships, and drug, alcohol, and smoking awareness.

### STEAM/Robotics Club- Advisor: Mr. Binazeski

The Robotics Club meets each week to learn about various concepts related to science, engineering, technology, and math. Students will engage with each other in collaborative projects, such as designing a real-life robot. This robot will be used in competition against other schools throughout the school year. Students will also have the opportunity to learn how to code their own Drones as part of the STEAM experience!

# **Student Council- Advisor: Mrs. Caputo**

The Hasbrouck Heights Middle School Student Council is an active governmental organization. Two students from every homeroom, at each grade level are elected by their peers to represent the general student body. These student representatives are required to attend one meeting per month, meetings which generally last one hour. Additionally, the students are required to participate in the committees and fundraising efforts. Through collaboration and dedicated leadership, the Student Council provides a voice for the general student body in creating the best possible school environment at HHMS!

### Volleyball Club- Advisor: Ms. Warren

# **MIDDLE SCHOOL ENTRANCE**

\*This will apply when we are back to school full-time with all students. \*

The Middle School Entrance is located on Paterson Avenue next to the Tennis courts. The Middle School Main Office is located on the second floor in the main hallway of the school. Hours of operation are 7:15am-3:15pm. A Visitor Monitor will be available at the Middle School Entrance to assist you upon your arrival.

- Parents/guardians should drop items off for your children between 9:00am and 10:00 a.m. This includes lunch, books, projects, etc. There are *Drop-Off Bins* located at the Middle School Entrance. All items should be placed in these bins and the Visitor Monitor will ensure delivery to each student.
- Interior gates will be used after school to deter movement throughout the building during off-hours. Please encourage your child to report to a supervised activity after school or exit the building promptly. Any student who is loitering in the school building unsupervised is subject to disciplinary action according to the Code of Conduct.

# COMMUNICATION

Hasbrouck Heights Middle School staff recognizes that students in grades 6-8 are faced with various developmental, academic, physical, and social changes in their lives. In order to best provide a collaborative approach to assisting our students in becoming self-sufficient, independent learners, we believe that effective and frequent communication between home and school is a necessity. We ask that you please contact your child's teacher as a first means to resolve any issue that may occur. Guidance Counselors and members of our Child Study Team are also available as an initial contact for any issues that may arise. Parents will receive ongoing communication from the school through the following procedures:

### Daily Homework Posting

All HHMS classroom teachers will post all homework, test, and project due dates on Genesis.

#### Official Staff Email Accounts

All HHMS staff members have an official email account ending in "@hhschools.org." Teachers are encouraged to respond to all emails in a timely manner. A complete list of staff email addresses is in this handbook and on the district website. Please contact all staff members directly via email. At that time, you may request a return phone call or a meeting.

### Telephone

Please contact the Middle School Office at 201-393-8170 with any questions or concerns regarding Hasbrouck Heights Middle School.

### Google Classroom

Parents should work closely with their child to monitor their Google Classrooms that have been set up for each class. Quite often, the most pertinent and timely information about upcoming assignments and assessments is communicated directly through Google Classroom.

### Back to School Night

Each fall, the Middle School invites parents to spend an evening at the school. The MS Faculty will present an overview of their instructional programs including classroom rules and procedures. Parents are encouraged to participate in the evening's activities in order to best familiarize themselves with their child's daily routine.

### Report Cards

Report cards are issued four times throughout each school year, once for each of the four Marking Periods. See the *MS Marking Period Dates* section of this Handbook for more information regarding specific dates.

#### Live Grades

All HHMS parents and guardians have access to live grades online, via Genesis. When a student receives a grade below a 65, an email is sent to the parent, guardian, and student. Once again, please note that Google Classroom should also be monitored on a regular basis, as a means of tracking your child's assignments.

### > Friday Folder

Each Friday throughout the school year, a newsletter is emailed home with important information, reminders, and announcements that are relevant to Hasbrouck Heights Middle School. You may also access the Friday Folder at any time on our school website. If you do not receive the Friday Folder, please contact the main office to update your email.

#### Twitter

Students, parents, and community members are encouraged to follow us on our Twitter page **@HHJrAviators**. The Junior Aviator Twitter page will contain information about upcoming events, as well as pictures and highlights from middle school events.

### Getting Messages to Students during the School Day

In order to maintain a safe, orderly, and productive school environment, the office staff will strive to minimize classroom interruptions.

- 1. Students are permitted to use the office telephone only in the event of an emergency (Forgetting homework does not constitute an emergency).
- 2. Students are responsible for checking in at the office to collect "dropped off" items.
- 3. Classrooms will not be interrupted to summon individual students to the office to collect items "forgotten" at home and delivered to school.
- 4. Parents should refrain from texting/calling students on their cell phones during the school day. Students will be disciplined according to the Code of Conduct, regardless of whether the communication is with a parent or guardian.

#### **Attendance**

All students are expected to make attendance in school a top priority. The teachers, administrators, and staff recognize their responsibility to provide a thorough and efficient education to all students. Therefore, it is critical that every student and parent/guardian accepts responsibility for attendance at school, as required by state law. Excellent attendance will positively impact student achievement!

#### **Absences**

If a student will be absent from school, it is the responsibility of the student's parent/guardian to notify the school. The process for notifying the school of the student's absence should be followed as outlined below:

- The parent/guardian should call Mrs. Lisa Mason in the Middle School Office at (201) 393-8170, no later than 8:30am (notification after 8:45am will be considered truant).
   If there is no answer, please leave a message on the voicemail system.
- 2. The information provided should include the student's name, grade, and a callback phone number to reach the parent/ guardian. It is our top priority to ensure the safety of our students at all times. **PLEASE BE SURE TO CALL IN ALL ABSENCES!**

Students that are absent from school for any reason are responsible for the completion of assignments missed during their absence. A student who is absent from school for observing a religious holiday shall not be deprived of any award, eligibility, or opportunity to compete for any award, or deprived of the right to take an alternate test or examination that was missed because of the absence, provided there is a written excuse of such absence signed by the parent.

Prolonged or repeated absences from school or from a class, excused or unexcused, deprives the student of the educational and classroom experiences deemed essential to learning. Excessive absences may result in retention at grade level or loss of credit/removal from a course, in accordance with policies of the Board of Education. According to BOE policy, a student who accrues more than 15 Absences may be in danger of losing credit for their course. Students shall be subjected to the school district's response for unexcused absences that count toward truancy during the school year as outlined in N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.6(a)4 and Regulation 5200.

Unexcused absences from school or from class within the school day may subject a student to consequences that may include the denial of a student's participation in co-curricular activities and/or athletic competition. Repeated absences from school interfere with the maintenance of good order and the continuity of classroom instruction. Such absences may result in the removal from a class or course of study.

#### **Tardiness**

We believe that punctuality is an important element of school attendance. Pupils who are late to school or late to class miss essential portions of the instructional program and create disruptions in the academic process for themselves and the other students.

Tardiness to school or class that is caused by a student's illness, an emergency in the student's family, the observance of a religious holiday, a death in the student's family, or by the student's compliance with a request or directive of an administrator will be considered justified and is excused. All other incidents of tardiness will be considered unexcused.

A student who develops a pattern of tardiness, excused or unexcused, will be offered counseling with an appropriate staff member to determine the cause of the tardiness.

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#### Late to School:

Any student who reports to school after 7:55am must report to the Visitor Monitor located at the Middle School entrance on Paterson Avenue. The student must sign in and receive two late passes from the Hall Monitor. One of the passes should be immediately given to the Main Office and the other should be given to the classroom teacher for admittance to his/her class.

### Discipline Issued for Tardies to School:

**Students are considered late if they have not arrived in Period 1 by 7:55am.** In accordance with Board policy, students who are tardy will be subject to disciplinary action as outlined below:

1-3 Tardies: Excused

4th Tardy:Central Detention7th Tardy:2 Central Detentions10th Tardy:Saturday School Detention

13<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Saturday School Detention & Action Plan Implemented 20<sup>th</sup> Tardy: Potential loss of course credit (if Action Plan not followed)

### Late to Class:

Lateness to class is excused only when a student has a pass from a staff member when arriving in class. If a student is less than three minutes late to class, the teacher has the authority to address the "time lost" as they see fit. If a student is late to class more than three minutes, it will be considered an unexcused tardy.

#### Fire Drills

Fire drills will be conducted at least one time each month during the school year. At the sound of the fire alarm, all students are to exit the building according to the directions posted in each classroom, or at the direction of the teacher/staff member in charge. Students are to conduct themselves in an orderly and silent fashion; misconduct of any kind while leaving or returning to the building is forbidden. Disciplinary action will be taken to any student in violation.

#### Lock Down Drills

Lock-Down Drills are conducted once each month and are designed to secure the school buildings efficiently and effectively. Students will be given clear directions by their classroom teacher regarding the procedures at the start of the school year. Students are expected to cooperate with all of the rules and procedures outlined by the classroom teacher.

#### Shelter-In-Place

Shelter-In-Place drills are designed to restrict movement throughout the school building for any particular reason. Most often, this type of drill is called when there is a medical emergency within the school building. No visitors to the school building will be permitted during a Shelter-In-Place.

### **Backpacks**

Middle School students are not permitted to carry their backpacks throughout the building during the school day. Students may bring a backpack with them to school; however, it must be kept inside of their locker for the duration of the school day. At the end of the school day, students may utilize their backpack to transport their belongings home. In order to exchange materials at their locker during the school day, the teachers at each grade level will provide designated times for students to visit their lockers. This creates a more structured environment for our students and staff, as well as promotes the necessary organizational skills needed to be successful in middle school. \*Backpacks WILL BE permitted during Phase One Hybrid A-B-C Model.\*

#### **Cell Phones**

Cell phones are not permitted at the middle school. Students may bring a cell phone to school with them, however, the phone must be housed inside of their school locker. Phones should be turned off or silenced during the school day. Students who are caught with their cell phone during the school day will be disciplined according to the Code of Conduct. #### **Dress Code**

Student attire that is worn to school is expected to be neat and clean. Any clothing that is transparent, distracting, or disruptive to the school environment will not be permitted. Clothing shall cover the torso and shorts/skirts should extend to the mid-thigh of the legs. Visible undergarments and flip-flops are not permitted. ### **School Lockers**

Lockers are designed only for the storage of books, backpacks, school supplies, and outerwear. All students are urged to take proper precaution with their possessions. Make sure lockers are closed and locked at all times. **Only school-issued locks will be used on lockers at Hasbrouck Heights Middle School.** Personal belongings should not be left where others may have the opportunity to take them. Please keep the lockers clean and free from odor-causing items. Students who tamper with other students' lockers will be subject to disciplinary action. Locker inspections will occur during the school year.

The Hasbrouck Heights School District respects student privacy and provides students with the use of a locker in which they may store clothing, school materials, and other personal property. Although each student is responsible for maintaining the locker assigned to him/her, all lockers are and shall remain the property of the school district. Students may not use multiple lockers for storage.

Lockers may not be used as a depository for substances or objects which are illegal or which constitute a threat to the health, safety, and welfare of the occupants of the school buildings. \*Lockers will NOT be used during Phase One Hybrid A-B-C Model. More

information on lockers to follow when students return to school full-time. \*

### Cafeteria/Lunchroom

Lunch period is an opportunity to relax and interact with friends. Students are expected to clean up after themselves, behave appropriately, and follow the directions of the teachers and administrators in charge. Trash barrels are available to deposit trash. There are also containers specifically designated for recycling, and all are encouraged to help with the school's effort in this regard. Leaving trash on the table or throwing trash on the floor is unacceptable. Students who display inappropriate behavior during lunch or who do not clean up after themselves may have restricted lunchroom access as a consequence. \*The Cafeteria will NOT be used during Phase One Hybrid A-B-C Model.

### Hallway Behavior

Students are expected to keep to the right while traveling in the hallways, keep voices low, and keep moving to your next classroom. It is important not to gather with friends or stop to talk during the passing of classes. Loitering could result in lateness to class. Students are not permitted to enter classrooms without a teacher present. Students must wait outside and line up along the lockers until the teacher arrives and/or permits student entrance.

### **Gum Chewing**

Careless disposal of gum in drinking fountains, furniture, and floors presents sanitation and cleaning problems with costly repair. **Therefore, gum chewing is not permitted.** 

#### **Assemblies & Performances**

Students are expected to:

- Enter and exit in a quiet and orderly manner.
- No talking or physical contact during the performance.
- Remain in your seat for the duration of the program, unless you have permission from a staff members. If a student must enter/exit, do so only between selections, not during a performance.
- Treat the speakers in a respectful manner and offer appropriate applause.

# **Academic Integrity**

One of our main goals each school year is to provide an atmosphere where academic honesty is valued. Students who engage in cheating and plagiarism are using someone else's work, claiming it as their own, for their own benefit. Cheating is defined as both giving and receiving information for the purpose of improving grades on a quiz, test, essay, research paper, or homework. Plagiarism is also considered cheating. A student who plagiarizes someone else's work will be disciplined according to BOE policy.

#### HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION AND BULLYING

- 1. Report all HIB's verbally to Vice Principal (Principal Designee) –staff member has two days to write report.
- 2. Vice Principal informs parents of all students involved on the day it occurs.
- 3. Investigation must begin within 1 day of the incident-investigation must be completed within ten school days.
- 4. Investigation must be given to the Superintendent within two days of completion.
- 5. Results must be provided to the School Board by the time of the next Board meeting.
- 6. Within five days of the Board of Education meeting the parents are sent a letter regarding the outcome of the investigation.
- 7. Parents can request a hearing in Executive Session after receiving all information and the hearing must be held within ten days of the request.
- 8. The Board of Education's decision may be appealed to the Commissioner of Education no later than 90 days after the issuance of the Board's decision.
- 9. A parent, pupil, legal guardian, or organization may file a complaint with the Division on Civil Rights within one hundred eighty days of the occurrence of any incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying based on membership in a protected group as enumerated in the "Law Against Discrimination," P.L. 1945, c.169 (C.10:5-1 et seq.).

#### Extra Help

If a student requires extra help in a subject area, each teacher will have at least one designated time for extra help each week (morning or afternoon). The Extra Help schedule will be disseminated to all students and parents at the start of each school year. The High School National Honor Society is also available every week on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays throughout the school year to assist any middle school students with academic work.

#### Junior Aviator Character MVP Program

In an effort to promote positive interactions within the school, as well as good moral character, Hasbrouck Heights Middle School utilizes the Junior Aviator Character MVP program. MVP Cards are issued to students by a staff member when the student is caught in the act of "doing something good". These cards are signed by the staff member and a middle school administrator before it is sent home to be celebrated by the student's family! Once a student earns an MVP card, they are automatically invited to Junior Aviator Night, which is a fun-filled night held at the middle school where students can enjoy a variety of different activities with their classmates and peers. #### **Heroes & Cool Kids Program**

Heroes & Cool Kids is a program designed to teach important life skills related to Character Education. Professional athletes work collaboratively with school guidance counselors to train high school athletes to serve as mentors to middle school students. These high school leaders will then provide guidance to our 6<sup>th</sup> grade students during their transition to middle school. Topics discussed with students include, but are not limited to: being a good friend, making healthy choices, being an active participant in the school community, bullying, violence, and substance abuse prevention. #### Sidekicks Program

Sidekicks is a program designed to build positive and healthy relationships between middle school students and elementary school students. Eighth graders will be selected leaders, who will be trained in providing lessons in Character Education to both Euclid and Lincoln school students. General life skills and topics such as peer pressure, good manners, respect for others, and conflict resolution are among some of themes discussed in this program. ### **MS TESTING**

#### PSAT (Grades 8-11): There will be NO PSAT test during the 2020-2021 School Year.

This is a practice test to help students prepare for the SAT test. This test is made up of Critical Reading, Writing, and Mathematics.

#### NJSLA Assessment in Language Arts and Mathematics: Grades 6-8: TBD

This is a computer- based assessment that measures student growth and readiness for college and career. It tests the skills that the students have acquired during their current and previous years in Language Arts and Mathematics.

#### NJSLA-Science (Grade 8 ONLY): TBD

This is a computer-based assessment that measures student proficiency with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Science, which examines their performance of scientific and engineering practices.

#### Link It Assessments (Grades 6-8): TBD

Link It is a computer-based benchmark assessment that all middle school students will take in the areas of Mathematics and Language Arts three separate times throughout the school year. These assessments mirror the NJSLA assessment and are aligned to the New Jersey Student Learning Standards.
